Friday Night Naturalist Series On Patrol in Alligator Country January 20 starts at 6:30 PM

Join veteran wildlife officer and author Bob Lee as he shares bigger-than-life but true tales about him and his fellow officers chasing poachers and wildlife violators. From Live Oak to the Everglades, from the cattle ranches

west of Lake Okeechobee to the rich inshore fishing grounds near Pine Island, these amazing experiences span the state. Discover the excitement, dangers, and disasters that game wardens face every day on the job.

Bob H. Lee is a 30-year veteran of the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission. He spent over three decades as a water patrol officer on the St. Johns River and as a land patrol lieutenant in Putnam, St. Johns, and Flagler counties. As a freelance writer, he has been published in *Flamingo*, *Florida Sportsman*, *International Game Warden* and other publications. He is the author of two books, *Backcountry Lawman* and *Bad Guys*, *Bullets*, *and Boat Chases*—published by the University Press of Florida. In 2014, Bob won the Florida Outdoor Writers Association Award for Excellence-in-Craft for *Backcountry Lawman*.

Bob has a Bachelor of Arts Degree in Criminal Justice from the University of South Florida. He lives with his wife, Karen, on eighteen acres next to a secluded lake in Putnam County, Florida.

Pack Walks are Back January 22 1:30 to 2:30 PM

Yes, they are back and held on the fourth Sunday in January, February, March and April. Well-behaved canines are encouraged to bring their humans for a gentle walk along TLNC's trails to culminate at the Education Dock for a greeting sniffing, little lie down and enjoying the smells on the breezes.
