

## **Red Tide and Sawfish**

#### **Naturalist Series**

**Friday, June 13th at 6:30 PM:** TLNC will be holding an evening naturalist program about red tides in Florida about research that is being done. Karen McDaniel-Tolentino, graduate student and researcher will present information on red tides and sawfish. Red tides which are occurring more and more frequently throughout the state. Red tides are harmful algal blooms that produce toxins that kill fish, injure turtles, make shellfish dangerous to eat and can cause health problems for people. Red tides are found in both salt and freshwater.

Sawfish, also known as carpenter sharks, are a family of very large rays characterized by a long, narrow, flattened rostrum or nose extension. They are among the largest fish and all species are critically endangered. Biologists are trying to determine what habitats smalltooth sawfish (the type found in Florida) use, how long they use the, and if habitat use patterns are similar in the different areas of their range.

#### Glop, Mire, Ooze or is it Mud?

Or scientifically it is cohesive sediment. Call it what you want, mud—a mixture of sediment and water—is one of the most common and consequential substances on Earth. Not quite solid, not quite a liquid, mud coats the bottoms of lakes, rivers and seas. Is used in construction, art, beauty products, and much more.

Most of us have a memory of playing in mud as a child, getting our hands dirty, making mud pies and sculpting art pieces. We may have filled an afternoon playing in mud as our imaginations soared.

Earth has been a muddy planet for 4 billion years, ever since water became abundant. Mud has formed massive floodplains such as the Mississippi Delta, tidal flats that store vast quantities of carbon and nutrients. Flood waters have spread mud along our rivers creating fertile fields.

Mixing soil, water and other natural materials like pebbles, leaves or grass provide children with endless possibilities for learning and creating. TLNC's **next Nature Sprouts program on June 25 from 10:30 to 11:30 will be about mud.** 

Nature Sprouts is designed for children 2 to 5 years old to have a positive learning experience in nature. Children must register to attend so we can be sure to have enough materials for each child. Children must be

## **Improvement Progress**

We have finished our parking area and stormwater ponds. We are now working on construction of our maintenance building. Although it is a little further distance to walk to our education building eventually a new building will be placed in the footprint of the old parking area. It is a great relief to no longer have to worry about people and cars interacting during events or field trips.

When our maintenance building is completed by mid summer, we will move equipment and materials in and get organized. This building will have air conditioned and non-air conditioned storage for education activities supplies, events (tents, displays, etc.), archival file storage, tractors, mowers, golf carts and more. We will be able

to move things from under our desks, tables and even our bathrooms where we have been storing things for years. Materials will be easier to find and retrieve reducing the amount of time and effort it takes to prepare for events and activities.

In the meantime, we are still nursing along our double-wide Natural History Museum which was constructed in 1987 and installed at TLNC a few years later. Because of a leak caused by a failing window seal, we recently had to replace the window, remove the insulation, drywall and more to make repairs. Thanks to the help of several volunteers and TLNC maintenance staff, we were able to make repairs before severe damage was done and in between rain storms. Because of the age of the building, we know similar types of repairs will be needed to maintain the museum in the future.



This is why Phase 3 of our education complex expansion is so important. A building to house all exhibits in one place, and provide community meeting spaces, offices, bathrooms and more is so vital. ### **Strawberry Moon**



Tomorrow June 11 is June's full moon. The first full moon of summer has traditionally been called the **Strawberry Moon.** While strawberries have a reddish-pink color and are roundish in shape, the name Strawberry Moon has nothing to do with the Moon's appearance. The name Strawberry Moon was used by many American indigenous tribes to mark the ripening of strawberries that were ready for gathering.

With flowers blooming and early fruit ripening, June is a time of great abundance. The Tlingit (from the Pacific Northwest) use the term Birth Moon in reference to the time when certain animal are born. Get outside tomorrow and check out the full moon--a gift from nature to us.
