
# We're Working to Improve

Some people have been concerned when they have come to our property and see the construction taking place to the west of our buildings. No, it isn't a development going in. We are moving our parking area westward, building the required retention ponds and a real maintenance building to hold and protect our equipment from the weather, vandalism and theft while providing a better working space for maintenance staff and volunteers.

This construction will open up the existing parking area for Phase 3 construction of a building to hold a new museum which will allow us to consolidate our exhibits and mounts, classrooms, offices, meeting areas, outdoor bathrooms and screened teaching/dining area.

The open area created by the new parking will allow us to plant wildflowers, provide "edges" for birds and other wildlife, and landscape for butterflies. Although unsightly now (most construction is), it will let us improve our habitat since we are lacking open space.

Our expansion has been in the planning stages for several decades and now we are seeing concrete results of the many efforts volunteers, staff and the Board have made to plan for improvements to meet the area's growing needs.
